Addendum:

- 1. Sub-committee reports
 - a. Core-Curriculum. Juliet Burgess presented for the sub-committee. The degrees at the bachelor level appear to be compliant with the BOR requirements for degree. The some of the degrees at the associate level were found to be questionable with compliance from the BOR. The committee also submitted a document that will be posted on the UCC moodle page outlining some suggested changes to the core. The majority of the changes were to move to a markedly less prescriptive form in the core and remove many of the required class and replace them with general categories. This was to aid in the junior college articulation.
 - b. Procedures and Policies: Donna Luse presented for the sub-committee. They noted several policies that needed to be updated and inconsistency between old procedures. They will continue to enumerate the needed changes. They also pointed out the many of these changes would affect the forms and the webpage.
 - c. Webpage: Rick Stevens presented for the sub-committee. Rob Glaze was contacted and a template was given to the sub-committee. The webpage has been updated to follow the new format. This update greatly improved the webpage cosmetically and functionally.
 - d. Forms: Lon Smith presented for the sub-committee. Four formats were investigated word documents, word forms built with word templates, two techniques under adobe acrobat (acroforms and Livecycle forms). The strengths and limitations of each form format was presented. A recommendation that new forms be built in Livecycle design was placed before the committee. The committee agreed with the recommendation. The strengths were the greatest amount of flexibility in the forms that could utilize free acrobat reader as an entry vehicle and the greatest potential to move to a paper-less procedure including digital signature of documents. The downside was that it required extensive programming knowledge and capability placing development in the hands of Lon Smith. Migration of the forms to the new format will begin immediately.
 - e. All the sub-committees worked very hard between the first to meeting with all member attending sub-committee meetings either face-to-face of electronically.
