III. Course Description

(3 SCH) Advanced medical literature evaluation with focus on "landmark" trials, those which have a substantive influence on evidence-based medicine and clinical practice.

IV. Curricular Objectives & Outcomes

Domain 1 – Foundational Knowledge

1.1 Learner (Learner) – Develop, integrate, and apply knowledge from the foundational sciences (i.e., *pharmaceutical*, *social/behavioral/administrative*, and *clinical sciences*) to evaluate the scientific literature, explain drug action, solve therapeutic problems, and advance population health and *patient-centered care*.

Domain 3 – Approach to Practice and Care

- 3.1 Problem Solving (Problem Solver) Identify problems; explore and prioritize potential strategies; and design, implement, and evaluate a viable solution.
- 3.2 Educator (Educator) Educate all audiences by determining the most effective and enduring ways to impart information and assess understanding.
- 3.6 Communication (Communicator) Effectively communicate verbally and nonverbally when interacting with an individual, group, or organization.

Domain 4 – Personal and Professional Development

- 4.1 Self-awareness (Self-aware) Examine and reflect on personal knowledge, skills, abilities, beliefs, biases, motivation, and emotions that could enhance or limit personal or professional growth.
- 4.2 Leadership (Leader) Demonstrate responsibility for creating and achieving shared goals, regardless of position.
- 4.3 Professionalism (Professional) Exhibit behaviors and values that are consistent with the trust given to the profession by patients, other healthcare providers, and society.

V. Course-Specific Objectives & Outcomes

- A. Develop a system for reading and evaluating primary medical literature (Learner, Self-aware).
- B. Break down medical literature into standard sections and communicate key points to healthcare professionals (Communicator, Educator).
- C. When reading primary medical literature, discern the answers to three critical questions (Problem-Solver)
 - 1. Is this a true finding?
 - 2. Can I apply this finding to my patients?
 - 3. Will this finding change my practice?
- D. Identify standard study designs (Learner), and defend or criticize the ethics of deviations from standard study designs (Professional).
- E. Determine patient-, population-, and institution-specific factors influencing the application of findings from primary medical literature (Professional).
- F. Work in a team to apply findings from primary medical literature to patients or populations (Leader).
- G. Present current standards of care in therapeutics from a perspective of landmark clinical trials (Learner, Educator).

VI. Course Topics

Topics will include research methods, evaluation of medical literature, biostatistics, and pharmacotherapy with an emphasis on cardiology, diabetes, and infectious disease.

VII. Instructional Methods & Activities

Students will participate in class mainly through active group discussion, problem-based learning, team-based learning, and both individual and group presentations. Slideshows and lectures will be used only minimally. Group activities will be student-led with faculty assistance when needed.

Students are expected to come to class prepared to actively participate in the day's activities. Most presentations will require a submitted assignment before class. Communication, leadership, professionalism, and the degree of participation will be assessed by faculty and by peers. Students should expect to present multiple times during the semester. Some quizzes and both exams will have a brief oral component; some quizzes may be online.

Grades will be rounded to the nearest whole number.

Late submission of any assignment will result in a penalty, as specified in the activity description. Late submission of any online quiz will result in zero (0) points for the online portion of that quiz.

Undergraduate midterm grades will be posted online for students to view via Banner. Midterm grades indicate a student's status at mid-semester only and do not indicate the final performance outcome of a student.

Written exam questions may be multiple-choice, fill-in-the-blank, short-answer, case- or scenario-based discussion, essay, or any other format deemed appropriate by the Course Coordinator. Oral exam questions will be assessed in the course meeting room or the faculty instructor's office. Oral responses will be recorded.

Written exams and quizzes will be individual work only. Oral quizzes will be team-based, and last approximately 15 minutes. The oral component of the final exam will be individual and last 5-10 minutes.

Evaluations and scores will be given to students within 1 week of the assessment or assignment due date. Exams will not be returned to the student; the Course Coordinator is available to review exams with students by appointment. Students who wish to challenge questions must do so within 1 week of scores being returned and should do so in writing. The result of challenges and the method for adjusting scores will be decided at sole discretion of the Course Coordinator.

Students must use a variety of literature sources, including but not limited to: primary literature found through ULM School of Pharmacy Library Resources and Clinical Guidelines found from the originating organizations. Required texts not available to the student will be provided via Moodle.

This course relies heavily upon active participation in class, for which prompt and consistent attendance is imperative. Students should be in class on time and prepared. If for whatever reason, a student anticipates missing or being late to class, that student should inform the course coordinator as soon as possible *before* being absent from or late to class.
