- Recall basic mathematical terms related to linear, quadratic, exponential, and logarithmic functions and express these terms in correct context;
- Apply the methods of algebra to solve applications involving intercepts, rates of change, inequalities, systems of equations, and interest growth;
- Verbally interpret relationships in data given as graphs, tables, and equations and express functions given in verbal context as a graph, table, or equation.

Homework: Homework assignments are available on WebAssign. All WebAssign homework assignments are currently available and may be accessed using the class key

It is important that you create a WebAssign account and register for the course as soon as possible.

The assignments are separated into three groups corresponding to the material on each of the exams. The problems are chosen to highlight the core concepts on each exam and mastery of these homework sets serve as a good indicator for exam performance. As such, you should ensure that you fully understand the material on these homework sets; that is, upon completion of the homework set, you should be capable of completing similar problems without the aid of the text or the various tools provided by WebAssign.

The homework sets in each group are due the day before the corresponding exam. Late work will **not** be accepted, and you are solely responsible for ensuring that these assignments are completed on time. These assignments are relatively long, so you should be working through them as we cover the material. Do **not** leave these assignments until the last minute.

Exams: There will be three in-class exams. The exams are tentatively scheduled as follows:

Exam 1: Thursday, September 28, 2017, Exam 2: Thursday, November 2, 2017, Exam 3: Thursday, November 30, 2017.

Though unexpected, any deviations from this schedule will be announced during lecture and reflected on the course website.
